"Power, Place and People: The Local and the Global" Northeastern University Graduate History Conference March 18th-19th 2017

Seminar by Visiting Scholar of the Nigeria Agricultural Policy Project Climate Change-Food Security-Governance Nexus: What Options for Smallholder Farmers in Nigeria? Tuesday, November 29, 3 p.m. TODAY Natural Resources Room 130

Nigeria is experiencing extreme weather events such as unusually high temperature and heavy rainfall. In order to adapt to the situation and ensure their own food security, smallholder farmers implement several strategies. The effect of these strategies are more often than not counter-productive. Also, farmers appear not to have the policy support which could enhance effective adaptation despite the existence of a Nigerian national adaptation strategy-action plan. This seminar presents a review of research on climate change in Nigeria. It examines the complexity of climate change, food security and the governance nexus. A critical assessment of the successes and gaps in research and policy within the last 10-15 years will be given. The implications of these on the availability or absence of alternative pathways and options for smallholder farmers will be discussed. Plausible suggestions for

the way forward and opportunities for the future will be addressed.

Dr. Adeola O. Olajide is an Agricultural Economist, with specialization in Farming and Rural Systems Economics. She has over 15 years of experience in social science research with particular focus on food security, agribusiness enterprise development and climate change using gender as a cross cutting theme. She has made significant contributions to agricultural development in Africa through quality research on social and economic issues of concern across the continent. Dr. Olajide's visit to MSU is sponsored by a USAID funded "Feed the Future Nigeria Agricultural Policy Project".
