The State University of New York College at Cortland invites applications for a tenure-track Assistant Professor of African History in the History Department starting Fall 2017. Responsibilities include teaching upper-level African History, world history survey, and an occasional graduate course; advise students; engage in scholarly activity; serve on departmental and college-wide committees. The department is eager to attract candidates also capable of teaching upper-level history courses on interactions between Africa and the wider world (through thematic topics such as empire, slavery, cross-regional trade, Islam, or migration).

Required qualifications include a Ph. D. by the time of appointment. Preference will be given to candidates with teaching experience; research agenda and scholarly profile; and strong interpersonal skills to build and maintain collegial working relationships.

Reevaluating the Black Experience in Higher Education in Africa and the United

States: Struggles, Survival, and Successes

Edited by: Ogechi E. Anyanwu and Timothy Forde

Reevaluating the Black Experience in Higher Education is a multidisciplinary and comparative study of higher education in post-colonial Africa and post-civil rights United States. It is edited by experts in the field of higher education and will be published by Eastern Kentucky University Libraries as an open access book. It seeks to capture the often forgotten educational challenges that continue to shape the educational experience of blacks in Africa and the United States. After more than five decades since independence in Africa and civil rights movement in the United States, has higher education experiments fulfilled the hopes and expectations of blacks? This book seeks to answer that question.

The editors would like to invite you to contribute a chapter in this edited book intended to give both students and instructors of Africa and African American studies a comprehensive and up-to-date account of the centrality of education in understanding the experience of black in the United States and Africa. The book will highlight the interconnectedness of race, religion, politics, economy, and society. Each manuscript should explore any of the themes below using one or two countries in Africa, states or higher educational institutions in the United States as a case study. We have designed the themes to guide scholars but authors are free to develop topics within the broad themes suggested. Each chapter should discuss the higher educational

traditions upheld by the chosen country or state during the colonial period or pre-civil right movement, the changes that occurred afterwards, and an comprehensive assessment of higher education policy outcomes in recent years. The editors welcome scholarly submissions from academics and researchers in the field.

You will receive notifications of acceptance of abstracts on January 5, 2017. If your proposal is accepted for publication, you will be requested to submit a complete essay on May 30, 2017 not more than 12,000 words. Papers must be original and should not be previously published or simultaneously been reviewed elsewhere for publication. All articles will be peer-reviewed before they are accepted for publication. The Michigan State University Alliance for African Partnership (AAP) is inviting proposals for its initial partnership activities in 2017.

As a university-wide initiative, AAP invites proposals from diverse disciplinary perspectives that support the pillars of Building Bridges, Transforming Institutions, and Transforming Lives, as well as the priority areas of:

- · Agri-food systems
- Water, energy and the environment
- Youth employment
- Education
- Cultural heritage development
- Health and nutrition

Successful proposals will be submitted by teams that include both MSU faculty and partners from African universities and/or organizations and should be designed to lay the foundation for longer duration and sustainable partnerships between MSU and African partners.
