




The event will include a Q&A session with the film's director, J. R. Biersmith.

One of the most important living writers of Hispanophone Africa, he has been a professor at the University of Colombia-Missouri, the assistant director of the Hispanic-Guinean Cultural Center of Malabo, and the director of the Center for African Studies in Murcia, Spain. He has lived in exile for over 50 years as a result of successive post-independence dictatorships in Equatorial Guinea.

"Ahmed Kathrada (1929-2017): A Tribute to a South African Activist for Non-Racialism and Democracy"

Thursday, April 27, 2017, 12 noon, (South Africa Freedom Day), Third Floor International Center

A panel of MSU faculty and South Africans will pay tribute to Ahmed Kathrada, South Africa freedom fighter and long-time partner of Nelson Mandela in Robben Island Prison and in the ANC government after elections in 1994. Kathrada (deceased March 28, 2017) published his *Letters from Prison* with MSU Press and was awarded an Honorary Doctorate by MSU for his lifetime of struggle for freedom, democracy, and non-racialism in South Africa and abroad. He has hosted many MSU faculty and students and even President Obama in tours of the Robben Island Prison near Cape Town. This tribute to Kathrada is being offered on South Africa Freedom Day, celebrated each year on 27th April, marking the anniversary of the day in 1994 when the country held its first ever all-race, democratic election, ending decades of sanctioned racial oppression under the apartheid system.

50 Years After: History, Memory and Legacy of the Nigeria-Biafra War

Dominican University, River Forest, Illinois
September 1-2, 2017

Since the passage of the Genocide Convention, the world has seen and witnessed several genocides in the last sixty years. Some of the significant genocides that have occurred in Africa in recent times include Igbo/Biafra, Rwandan and Darfur genocides. These genocides, as was the case of the Armenian, Kosovan genocides, all reflect the historical conflagration of human bestiality, age old prejudices and biases that resonate with Nazi trivialization of Jewish personhood - in shape, though not in magnitude. However, unlike the Jews, Armenians, Rwandan and Darfur genocides, the Igbo genocide has been neglected by scholars, activists, and community and national leaders.

On the occasion of the fiftieth anniversary of the Nigeria-Biafra war (1967-1970), we invite scholars, community activists and human rights practitioners to an International Conference to be held at Dominican University, Chicago, to address the following issues: history and memory of the war; the status of academic research on the Igbo genocide; impact of the war on children; an integrated international human rights response;

international criminal law perspective; and role of civil society, community and international organizations.

The conference is jointly coordinated by [Professor Nkuzi Nnam](#), Director, Director Black World Studies, Dominican University, Chicago and Professor [Chima Korieh](#), Director, Biafra War Oral History Project.

The conference committee will be pleased to welcome 300- word abstract no later than June 10, 2017. Please include a 50 word biographical data and as well as the author's name, address, telephone number, email address, and institutional affiliation. A full version of the paper to be presented should be submitted by August 20, 2017.

The [Melville J. Herskovits Prize](#) is awarded to the author of the most important scholarly work in African studies published in English during the preceding year. Deadline for nominations: April 30. Please note - Nomination letters must be received by the Secretariat by April 30 and all review copies of the publications need to be post-marked by the same date.

The [Bethwell A. Ogot Book Prize](#) is awarded to the author of the best book on East African Studies published in the previous calendar year. Deadline for nominations: April 30. Please note - Nomination letters must be received by the Secretariat by April 30 and all review copies of the publications need to be post-marked by the same date.

The [Distinguished Africanist Award](#) recognizes a lifetime of distinguished contributions to African studies. Deadline for nominations: April 30.

The [Graduate Student Paper Prize](#) is awarded to the best graduate student paper presented at the previous year's Annual Meeting. Deadline for nominations: April 30.

The [Paul Hair Prize](#) recognizes the best critical edition or translation into English of primary source materials on Africa published during the preceding two years. Deadline for nominations: April 30.

The [Gretchen Walsh Book Donation Award](#) offers an annual grant program to assist book donation projects with shipping costs to send books to African libraries and schools. Deadline for nominations: April 30.

The [Royal Air Maroc- ASA Student Travel Award](#) is granted to students to facilitate and increase the movement of students and the exchange of ideas, between students of African Studies in Africa and the United States. The overarching aim of the award is to acknowledge outstanding scholarship by future African Studies scholars. Deadline for nominations: April 30.

Chair of the African and African American Studies Department - Washington University in St. Louis

The School of Arts & Sciences at Washington University in St. Louis seeks a dynamic senior scholar to lead its newly established Department of African and African American Studies (AFAS) and develop its future planning and direction. Founded in 1969 as Black Studies, it is one of the oldest programs in the country. Last fall, the University granted AFAS departmental status and committed significant resources, including multiple hiring lines and ample programming funds, to develop and grow the department.

Qualified candidates will have significant teaching experience with both graduate and undergraduate students and a distinguished record of research and publishing required for a tenured position as a full professor. (Exceptional applicants at the advanced associate professor level for whom the rank of full is imminent will also be considered.) Moreover, qualified candidates must have demonstrable administrative and leadership ability. A PhD or an equivalent terminal degree with a principal focus on some aspect or region of Africa and/or its

Diaspora is required.

The duties of chair include developing and implementing academic and scholarly activities for the department, planning finances and budgets, and supervising faculty, staff, and students in the department. In dialogue with colleagues and stakeholders across the university, the chair will formulate a strategic vision for African and African American Studies. Because the department has a long-standing commitment to the city of St. Louis, it is expected that the chair will engage the department in the civic life of the community beyond the walls of the university. The chair reports to the dean of the Faculty of Arts & Sciences. As a professor, the chair's regular duties will include research and writing for publication, teaching, advising students, departmental governance, and university service.

Application materials should include the most recent version of the applicant's curriculum vitae and a formal letter of interest that lists three references. Materials can be sent, and questions can be addressed, to Adrienne Davis, William M. Van Cleve Professor of Law, at adriennedavis@wustl.edu.

Full consideration and priority will be given to application materials received by August 1, 2017, but materials will be considered and evaluated as they arrive.
