


In the Field with Matthew Angelo Harrison

Fellowships & Scholarships

International Dissertation Research Fellowship (IDRF) Deadline: November 7, 2018.

The Mellon International Dissertation Research Fellowship (IDRF) offers nine to twelve months of support to graduate students in the humanities and humanistic social sciences who are enrolled in PhD programs in the United States and conducting dissertation research on non-US topics. Seventy fellowships are awarded annually. Fellowship amounts vary depending on the research plan, with a perfellowship average of \$22,000. The fellowship includes participation in an SSRC-funded interdisciplinary workshop upon the completion of IDRF-funded research.

U.S. Department of State Critical Language Scholarship (CLS) Program

Application Deadline: Tuesday, November 27, 2018 by 8:00pm EST

Applications are now being accepted for the U.S. Department of State's Critical Language Scholarship (CLS) Program at http://www.clscholarship.org/apply Applications are due Tuesday, November 27, 2018 by 8:00pm EST. The CLS Program is a fully-funded intensive overseas language and cultural immersion program for U.S. undergraduate and graduate students enrolled at U.S. colleges and universities. Students spend eight to ten weeks abroad studying one of 15 critical languages: Arabic, Azerbaijani, Bangla, Chinese, Hindi, Indonesian, Japanese, Korean, Persian, Portuguese, Punjabi, Russian, Swahili, Turkish, and Urdu. Most CLS languages do not require previous study of the target language.

The program includes intensive language instruction and structured cultural enrichment experiences designed to promote rapid language gains. The scholarship program includes international airfare, tuition, and all program costs, as well as meals and living accommodations (often with a host family).

The CLS Program seeks participants with diverse interests, and from a wide range of fields of study and career paths, with the purpose of representing the full diversity of the United States. Participants are selected based on their commitment to language learning and plans to apply their language skills to their future academic or professional pursuits.

CLS is part of a wider government initiative to expand the number of Americans studying and mastering foreign languages that are critical to national security and economic prosperity. CLS plays an important role in preparing students for the 21st century's globalized workforce and increasing national competitiveness.

GJEC fellowship competition

Deadline: December 2, 2018

The Gender, Justice, and Environmental Change (GJEC) Program is pleased to announce fellowships available to MSU graduate students. Generous funding provided by MSU's Graduate School allows us to offer fellowship opportunities in the following two categories:

GJEC Dissertation Research Fellowship (Up to \$10,000)

Eligibility: PhD. students at MSU who have completed all requirements for their degree with the exception of their dissertation research. Applicants must have dissertation projects that focus specifically on the gender dimensions of environmental and/or agricultural change.

GJEC Dissertation Completion Fellowship (\$8,500)

Eligibility: PhD. students at MSU who have completed dissertation research and all other requirements for their degree program, except for completion of the dissertation. Applicants must graduate by the end of Fall 2020 with a dissertation focused on the gender dimensions of environmental and/or agricultural change.

We encourage previously unsuccessful applications to reapply. Applications are due December 1st, 2018, and are available at <u>https://gencen.isp.msu.edu/graduate-students/funding/</u>

Applicants do not need to be enrolled in the GJEC specialization to be eligible. Carnegie African Diaspora Fellowship Program Deadline: December 9, 2018.



Accredited universities in Ghana, Kenya, Nigeria, South Africa, Tanzania and Uganda can submit a <u>project request online</u> to host a scholar.

Scholars born in Africa, who live in the United States or Canada and work in an accredited college or university in either of those two countries, can apply online to be placed on a roster of available candidates for a fellowship. Scholars must hold a terminal degree in their field and may hold any academic rank.

Links to the African host institution project request application, scholar roster application and guidelines are posted on the <u>CADFP website</u>. Selection decisions will be made in April 2019; project visits can begin as early as May 2019 and must be completed by August 31, 2019.

African History/Africana Studies- Dupauw University Deadline: November 12, 2018.

The Department of History at DePauw University, in collaboration with the Africana Studies Program, invites applications for a tenure-track position in African History, geographic focus and time-period open. Appointment to begin August 2019. The position contributes to the History department's global learning commitment and offers an opportunity to re-imagine the African history curriculum of the History Department and the Africana Studies program, including surveys and topically-focused courses at introductory and advanced undergraduate levels. The ability to regularly teach History of the Black Atlantic, a core course of the Africana Studies Program, as well as Introduction to Africana Studies, is essential. Sub-specialties might include, but are not limited to, environmental history, migration, the trans-Atlantic slave trade, history of medicine, global health, and women and gender. Candidates should demonstrate the potential to be an outstanding teacher in the liberal arts context, an active scholar in their field, and a contributor to a vibrant, student-centered curriculum in the Department and the University. Committed to inclusive excellence in its own practice, the committee seeks a colleague who will promote a dynamic classroom environment valuing the contribution of multiple perspectives. PHD preferred, ABD considered. Prior teaching, post-doctoral, or other related experience desired.

Racialisation and Publicness in Africa and the African Diaspora

African Studies Centre & St Antony's College, University of Oxford June 27-28, 2019 Proposal Deadlines: 30 November, 2018 (Individual); December 10, 2018 (Panel.)

From the fatal shooting of the 17-year old Trayvon Martin in Florida, United States, and the recent deportation threats faced by the Windrush generation in Britain to the continued practices of dehumanisation experienced by black Africans in Mauritania and contemporary resistance to Empire and its devastating consequences as symbolised by the #RhodesMustFall movement in South Africa and Oxford, racialisation of black people in Africa and in the Diaspora and the attendant (counter-) hegemonic reactions and/or resistance to racialisation have transplanted the DuBoisian twentieth-century problem into that of the twenty-first century.

Against this backdrop, this conference will address the contemporary problem of racialisation in Africa

and the African Diaspora (old and new.) We are interested in papers and panels that examine why and how racial identities and categories are constructed, imagined and inscribed (in)to the social, political and economic processes, practices and relationships in Africa and the African Diaspora-with significant consequences and implications for human life as well as for what Achille Mbembe describes in Critique of Black Reason (2017) as the global 'in-common.'
