



The MSU Libraries will be hosting a reading of names of victims of genocide. As it's the 25th year after the Rwandan genocide against the Tutsi, we will begin and end our vigil with names of people murdered there. Cosponsored by the MSU African Studies Center, MSU Asian Studies Center, Center for Gender in Global Context, Serling Institute for Jewish Studies and Modern Israel, Center for Latin American and Caribbean Studies, MSU Muslim Studies Program, Peace & Justice Studies Program, and the Residential College in the Arts and Humanities.

Tuesday, April 16, 2019 • 7–9 pm *Keepers of Memory*: Film Screening and Panel Discussion Green Room (4 West)

Through eyewitness accounts and gripping footage, acclaimed director Eric Kabera takes the viewer on an emotional journey into the 1994 Rwandan genocide against the Tutsi, its survivors, and the memorials created in the victims' honor. The film focuses on the personal accounts of men and women who watch over the sacred burial sites keeping the memories alive for future generations. They tell a tale of unimaginable pain and loss that is both inspirational and thought provoking as they bravely face the future and rebuild their lives.

Afrobarometer Report

Africans see progress - though uneven - in government delivery of basic services



Africans see more improvement than decline in their governments' delivery of basic public services, according to new Afrobarometer survey findings from across the continent.

Though uneven, progress is reported in the state's provision of education, medical care, identity documents, and police assistance. On average across 34 surveyed countries, service delivery is most often seen as easy to access, timely, courteous, and responsive to complaints. But countries vary greatly in popular assessments of government performance, and petty corruption is still a frequent experience.

An analysis of survey responses shows that three main factors drive whether Africans see their governments as getting better or worse at delivering services: how easy or difficult the service was to obtain, whether officials will respond to complaints, and whether citizens had to pay a bribe.

The analysis, available at www.afrobarometer.org, is the fourth of Afrobarometer's Pan-Africa Profiles based on 45,823 interviews in all regions of Africa.

Non-Tenure track Teaching Position - Penn State University African Studies Program Deadline: Open

The African Studies Program at The Pennsylvania State University invites applications for a full-time lecturer position, starting August 2019. This position is a one-year, non-tenure track appointment with the possibility of renewal for up to three years. Responsibilities primarily include teaching introductory to intermediate undergraduate courses in African Studies along with supporting duties in the African Studies Program. Teaching load is six courses per academic year. The ideal candidate will be able to teach a range of courses on contemporary Africa, which may include Introduction to Contemporary Africa, African Literature, Africa in Cinema, Gender Relations in Africa, Urbanization and Health in Contemporary Africa, and Traditional and Contemporary Religions in Africa. Minimum requirement is a Master's degree in a related discipline; a Ph.D. and relevant research and experience in the field are preferred.

Candidates will be evaluated on the following criteria (1) promise as a teacher, (2) promise as a scholar and (3) commitment to work with a diverse student body. To be considered for this position, applicants must include a cover letter detailing relevant qualifications, a current CV (with the names and contact

information of three references), a one-page teaching philosophy statement, and a recent publication or writing sample.
