

Remembering the Rwanda Genocide Against the Tutsi 25 Years Later

The MSU Libraries will be hosting a reading of names of victims of genocide. As it's the 25th year after the Rwandan genocide against the Tutsi, we will begin and end our vigil with names of people murdered there. Cosponsored by the MSU African Studies Center, MSU Asian Studies Center, Center for Gender in Global Context, Serling Institute for Jewish Studies and Modern Israel, Center for Latin American and Caribbean Studies Program, and the Residential College in the Arts and Humanities.

Tuesday, April 16, 2019 • 7-9 pm Keepers of Memory: Film Screening and Panel Discussion Green Room (4 West)

Through eyewitness accounts and gripping footage, acclaimed director Eric Kabera takes the viewer on an emotional journey into the 1994 Rwandan genocide against the Tutsi, its survivors, and the memorials created in the victims' honor. The film focuses on the personal accounts of men and women who watch over the sacred burial sites keeping the memories alive for future generations. They tell a tale of unimaginable pain and loss that is both inspirational and thought provoking as they bravely face the future and rebuild their lives.

International Symposium on Genocide Confronting the Past and Understanding the Present

Friday, April 19, 8:00 a.m. - 5:30 p.m. MSU Union Baliroom

We have invited interdisciplinary and international scholars to share their knowledge on the causes and consequences of genocide, and on social transformations after genocides. The symposium will cover various topics, including the social, historical, and political contexts and detailed processes of genocide; consequences of genocide such as sexual assault/rape, trauma, and mental health; genocide remembrance, denial, ideologies, impunity, and revisionism; transitional justice; and reconciliation and forgiveness after genocide.

Zachary D. Kaufman, J.D., Ph.D. 11:30 a.m. - 12:30 p.m.

Reshaping the Euphemism of "Never Again": Recent Approaches to Preventing Genocide



Zachary D. Kaufman is a Senior Fellow at Harvard while teaching at Stanford. He is the author or editor of three books (including *After Genocide: Transitional Justice, Post-Conflict Reconstruction, and Reconciliation in Rwanda and Beyond;* Oxford University Press, 2009) and author of over 40 articles and book chapters. He has served in all three branches of the U.S. government and at three international criminal tribunals (for Rwanda and for the former Yugoslavia as well as the International Criminal Court).

He currently serves on the advisory board of Indego Africa, a social enterprise that partners with cooperatives of artisan women in Rwanda and Ghana to bring their products to Western markets. From 2001-2015, he was the founder, president, and chair of the board of the American Friends of the Kigali Public Library, which partnered with the Rotary Club of Kigali-Virunga to build Rwanda's first-ever public library, the Kigali Public Library (also known as Rwanda Library Services). Dr. Kaufman received his Ph.D. In international relations from Oxford, his J.D. from Yale Law School, and his B.A. in political science from Yale.

Prior to her appointment, Ambassador Mukantabana was a tenured professor of history at Cosumnes River College (CRC) in Sacramento,

California, from 1994 to 2013. She is also co-founder and president of the Friends of Rwanda Association, a nonprofit American relief association created in the wake of the 1994 Genocide against Tutsi in Rwanda.
